3 Forthcoming events

Expert Seminar in The Hague, on 17th and 18th May 2009

Theme: Education and training challenged by innovation and creativity in society: dealing with new societal demands. Eunec full members are preparing the seminar, in close collaboration with the host council, the Onderwijsraad from the Netherlands.

EUNEC wants to explore the main challenges for education policies within the next 10 years. The seminar will be a contribution of EUNEC to the discussion on the future objectives for the education and training work programme of the European Union beyond 2010.

Conference in October 2009

Theme : Guidance to children, young people and adults through the transition moments in their life long curriculum in order to achieve equity and avoid social exclusion.

One of the main objectives of EUNEC is to help to realize social cohesion and equity. Children and young people, especially form the most vulnerable groups (for instance with migrant background) need support to be able to make the right choices at transition moments in their curriculum. Different sub-themes can be advanced: early childhood, the transition from primary to secondary education, the transition from secondary to higher education, early school leaving, the transition to the labour market. The venue of this conference is still to be decided.

Study on education councils

In 2008, the Executive Committee decided to order a new study on education councils and advisory bodies in the enlarged EU.

In 2009, the researchers will proceed to an in-depth case analysis. Cases are chosen based on inventory and survey results, after consultation with the steering group and feedback from an international expert committee.

Eunec will organise in October 2009 a working seminar with EUNEC full and associate members on the preliminary research results of this study.

4 EUNEC conference 'The teaching profession; changes, challenges and perspectives' (Vilnius, 13-15 October 2008)

EUNEC organised this conference hosted by the Lithuanian Education Council.

More than hundred participants out of 17 EU countries worked together on the current European education issue of the teaching profession.

On Monday 13th of October, they focused on societal and educational challenges for teachers.

After a round table and some presentations about this subject and about the OECD Talis project, the new role of teachers and the needed competences were discussed in working groups.

On Tuesday 14th of October, the central theme was the making of lifelong learning for teachers a reality; how to enhance competences through a continuum of provisions?

Paul Holdsworth from the European Commission presented the Commission's policies on Teacher Education including the Communication on Competences for the 21st Century.

The round table tried to define the reforming and rethinking of initial teacher training (within or outside the Bologna Process), with representatives of different education councils, members of Eunec.

After lunched, participants listened to the contribution of Gary Brace from the General Teaching Council in Wales on in-service teacher training and education. This theme was discussed afterwards in working groups: priorities and projects in education councils on in-service teacher training and education.

On the final day of the conference, the participants formulated common statements and recommendations based on the conclusions of the working groups.

The EUNEC study on education councils in the EU was presented by Jan Van Damme and Jonathan Gaskell form the Public Management Institute (Catholic University of Louvain, Belgium). They made some interviews of Council's representatives during the meeting.
